Applicants are required to complete the full admissions process for admission to the Bachelor of Architecture program. A cumulative GPA of 2.0 is required.

The online Bachelor of Architecture degree at Dunwoody College of Technology offers a three year path to becoming a licensed, practicing architect with a capacity to approach the world's great design challenges.

Students who have completed their AAS degree in an architectural drafting or a related program are eligible to transfer into the Bachelor of Architecture completion program at Dunwoody.

The Bachelor of Architecture is committed to social and environmental justice through studio work focused on civic engagement and climate action in communities across the globe. Our distinctive position within a college of technology gives us access to collaborations across a variety of technical disciplines. Our students participate in design-build projects, and engage in global activism and climate initiatives, from Minneapolis to Puerto Rico.

Bachelor of Architecture students receive a dedicated touch-screen laptop with a suite of Autodesk and Adobe programs to be used as long as they are enrolled as students.

In addition, practice-based curriculum, professional-focused philosophy, and actively-practicing faculty gives students the ability to work in the profession while completing their degree. This can defray the cost of education, make students more valuable earlier in their career, and allow students to complete all required experience for licensure prior to graduation.

Dunwoody's Bachelor of Architecture is accredited by the National Architectural Accrediting Board (NAAB). In accordance with NAAB standards, the Bachelor of Architecture maintains a Learning and Teaching Culture Policy.

HOW TRANSFER CREDIT WORKS

BLOCK TRANSFER

Dunwoody's Bachelors completion degree is intended to apply education from your technical program. We will accept a block transfer of up to 45 architectural degree requirements from Central Community College to the technical course requirements at Dunwoody College of Technology. In addition we will transfer up to 30 General Education (Arts and Science) credits from your college experience.

WHERE TO FIND THE INFORMATION

- 1. Create account/log into Transferology at TRANSFEROLOGY.COM/SCHOOL/DUNWOODY
- 2. Input one or more courses you have completed into the Will My Courses Transfer? menu
 - a. Enter school name
 - b. Update year and term course was completed
 - c. Enter Department and then select course using the + sign
- 3. After courses are entered, select Search for Matches on the right side of the page
- 4. Select the % match button next to Dunwoody's name
- 5. Individual course matches will be listed
- 6. Block transfers towards Bachelor Completion programs can be viewed by clicking the Pathways button

FINANCIAL AID & SCHOLARSHIPS

Financial Aid helps bridge the gap between what students and their family can pay and what it costs to attend Dunwoody. Most Dunwoody students receive some form of financial aid, including federal and state grants, federal loans, and work study. Financial aid is available to students who qualify based on information provided in their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form.

Dunwoody also distributes about \$2 million in scholarships each year. Each scholarship has its own criteria. To be considered for these scholarships, a completed FAFSA form must be on file with the Financial Aid Office. There are no separate applications for these scholarships. Students are notified through their Dunwoody email account if they are awarded a scholarship.

TRANSFER EVALUATION

Dunwoody accepts course credits from other regionally or nationally accredited higher education institutions. Transfer evaluations completed by other institutions are not accepted. Only course work earned at the institution issuing the official transcript will be evaluated. Courses will be considered for transfer if they meet the established criteria.

- Send official transcripts from all previously attended colleges to Admissions department.
- 2. Registrar's Office evaluates official transcripts for potential transfer credits.

Students may be asked to provide a syllabus listing the course description and competencies of coursework or student work.

Transfer courses will have a grade of TR. Transfer credits will not be computed into cumulative GPA. However, they will impact student's Satisfactory Academic Progress pace for completion.

TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS

- The technical requirements will be reviewed by Dunwoody faculty for the application of a block transfer of credits.
 - Up to 45 credits for Bachelor of Architecture.
- Cumulative GPA of a 2.0 or higher will be considered for the block transfer.
- The general education course(s) under consideration must be comparable in nature, content and level to a course offered by Dunwoody.
- Specific technical or mathematic courses taken outside of the last 5 years will be reviewed for content relevancy.
- Experiential Learning such as study abroad, independent study, workshops, field experience, and internships may or may not transfer, depending on the level and the comparability of the learning experience.
- Lower division credits may transfer as upper division if the course content and rigor is comparable and allows the student to meet the upper-division degree requirements.
